



Colorado

Predominantly nonwhite school districts in Colorado have 16% less funding than predominantly white school districts, a gap that increases when narrowing the comparison to high-poverty districts. A look at racial disparities between school districts in Colorado, by the numbers.

RACIAL ISOLATION




32% of Colorado students attend racially isolated school districts, with 18% of students in **nonwhite districts** (> 75% nonwhite) and 14% in **white districts** (> 75% white).



12% of Colorado students attend **high poverty, nonwhite districts** (> 75% nonwhite and > 20% poverty rate) while 1% attend **high poverty, white districts** (> 75% white and > 20% poverty rate).

DISTRICT SIZE


The average **white school district** in Colorado has just 1,552 students compared to 15,406 in the average **nonwhite school district**. The average poor, white district has 427 students compared to 12,788 in the average poor, nonwhite district.



FUNDING DISPARITIES

\$2,218 per student

That's how much more funding **white school districts** in Colorado have, on average, compared to **nonwhite school districts**.



\$2,770 per student

That's how much more funding **high poverty, white school districts** in Colorado have, on average, compared to **high poverty, nonwhite districts**.
